OUR MISSION Build female leadership in post-conflict countries—Rwanda, Cambodia, Liberia, and Guatemala, so far — by equipping and empowering driven young women with the education, mentorship support, and leadership training needed to change their nations and the world.

OUR IMPACT

Since 2011 SHE-CAN has grown to influential levels:

- **84 low-income women** have won full-ride scholarships
- **37 graduates** are emerging leaders
- **Over 400 mentors and volunteers** support SHE-CAN scholars
- **\$21 million in scholarship funds** have been awarded to date
- **30 U.S. colleges** such as Bucknell, Georgetown, and Dartmouth are enriched by SHE-CAN scholars
- **14 U.S. colleges** have joined the SHE-CAN Scholarship Coalition by committing to fund full-ride scholarships:

HOW WE DO IT Our program begins with intensive recruiting in each country to identify low-income young women who are passionate about changing their nations. Each scholar is matched with a team of five mentors who help her with her college application and serve as a support system throughout her leadership journey.
